Spotlight

On May 31, 2026, Punjab Director General of Police (DGP) Gaurav Yadav announced that the State's anti-drug campaign, *Yudh Nashian Virudh* (War Against Drugs), had completed 15 months of operations. Since its launch on March 1, 2025, Punjab Police has registered 46,937 cases under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act and arrested 65,884 accused persons. Seizures during the campaign included 2,950 kilograms of heroin, 792 kilograms of opium, 666 quintals of poppy husk, 71 kilograms of hashish (*charas*), 986 kilograms of marijuana (*ganja*), 56 kilograms of methamphetamine (ICE), and more than 5.5 million intoxicant pills and tablets. Authorities also recovered approximately INR 200 million in drug-related cash and froze assets worth nearly INR 3 billion belonging to around 750 alleged drug traffickers. The campaign has involved daily, coordinated anti-drug operations across all 28 police districts of the State.

The month in review

In May 2026, Punjab continued to experience a surge in violence linked to Khalistani terrorist networks and Punjabi gangster groups, including the daylight killing of a police officer while he was *en route* to duty, alongside an ongoing series of targeted killings associated with transnational organized crime syndicates. At the same time, Canada continued to report targeted killings involving persons of Indian origin linked to Punjabi gang networks, highlighting the increasingly transnational character of Punjabi organized crime and its expanding footprint of violence across jurisdictions.

On May 24, 2026, unidentified armed assailants shot dead Punjab Police Assistant Sub-Inspector (ASI) Joga Singh, who was posted in the Traffic Wing of the Amritsar Police Commissionerate, while he was travelling to duty on his scooter along the Fatehgarh Churian–Majitha road in Amritsar district. Shortly after the attack, a social media poster attributed to the little-known Tehreek-e-Taliban Hindustan (TTH) claimed responsibility for the killing and threatened further attacks against security personnel and government officials. The group's purported Al-Burq Brigade warned of additional targeted killings and called on government officials to resign "if they want to live." Subsequently, on May 27, 2026, TTH-linked social media accounts circulated video footage purportedly showing the attack, depicting motorcycle-borne assailants shooting the officer.

As targeted killings continue unabated in the State, a 22-year-old salon worker, Kunal, was shot dead by unidentified assailants in the Tehsilpura area of Amritsar district on May 13, 2026. According to reports, the attackers paraded his body on a scooter through Sharifpura in the early hours of May 14 and filmed the act, reportedly sending the videos and photographs to the alleged mastermind. Police suspect the murder was linked to an ongoing gang rivalry involving associates of gangster Sukha Ambarsaria.

Earlier, on May 1, 2026, Gurpreet Singh *aka* Gopi Nijjar, reportedly the last surviving witness in the 2015 murder case of gangster Sukha Kahlwan, was shot dead by unidentified assailants at Dhilwan in Kapurthala district. Nijjar, a close associate of Kahlwan, had reportedly received threats linked to his role in the case. Subsequently, a social media post attributed the killing to Doni Bal and his associates, claiming it was carried out in retaliation for Nijjar's alleged links to the Lawrence Bishnoi gang and his purported support for rival criminal groups.

Apart from these killings, two low-intensity explosions near military and security installations in Jalandhar and Amritsar within a span of a few hours on May 5, 2026, raised fresh concerns about Punjab's security environment. The first blast occurred near the gate of the Border Security Force (BSF) Headquarters in Jalandhar, when a parked scooter exploded in a busy commercial area, damaging nearby property and causing minor injuries to a delivery worker. About two hours later, a second explosion occurred near the perimeter wall of the Army Cantonment on Khasa Road in Amritsar, damaging a tin sheet installed along the boundary wall. Subsequently, the Khalistan Liberation Army (KLA), through a letter circulated on social media, claimed responsibility for the Jalandhar blast, stating that the attack was carried out to avenge the killing of Ranjit Singh, the prime suspect in the February 22 fatal shootings of Assistant Sub-Inspector (ASI) Gurnam Singh and Home Guard *jawan* Ashok Kumar in February 2026. Ranjit Singh was killed in a police encounter in Gurdaspur district on February 25, 2026.

Meanwhile, in Canada, two youths believed to be of Punjabi origin, aged 16 and 18, were shot dead in a targeted attack inside an underground parking lot in the Newton neighbourhood of Surrey, British Columbia, on May 10, 2026. While Canadian authorities did not disclose the identities of the victims or specific details of the case, the Integrated Homicide Investigation Team (IHIT) confirmed that the double homicide was targeted and linked to the ongoing gang conflict in British Columbia. Both victims, residents of Surrey, were reportedly associated with organized crime networks.

On May 4, 2026, an Indian-origin bookie, Simranjit Singh *aka* Sam Canada, who was reportedly linked to the Lawrence Bishnoi gang and described as its "accountant" in Canada, was shot dead in a targeted attack in the Newton area of Surrey, British Columbia. Investigators were reportedly examining the possible involvement of pro-Khalistan shooters with links to India. Soon after the killing, fugitive gangster Rohit Godara, who is believed to have split from the Bishnoi network, claimed responsibility through a social media post, alleging that the victim was a "close associate" and key handler of rival groups involved in match-fixing and illegal betting operations in Canada. The post further warned that others supporting rival gangs would also be targeted, though Canadian authorities have not officially verified the claim.

In another significant development, a May 25, 2026, report revealed that Peel Regional Police had arrested 17 suspects, most of them young men of Punjabi origin, linked to a violent criminal network allegedly involved in extortion, shootings, and arson attacks targeting South Asian business owners in the Greater Toronto Area of Ontario, Canada. According to investigators, the group, known as "Four Brothers," was connected to multiple violent incidents involving restaurants, trucking companies, and other businesses in Brampton, Mississauga, Caledon, and parts of British Columbia, with reported links extending to California in the United States (US).

During May, the Punjab Police continued its flagship anti-narcotics campaign, *Yudh Nashian Virudh* (War Against Drugs), alongside *Operation Prahar* under the *Gangstran te Vaar* (Attack on Gangsters) initiative, with the objective of disrupting the interconnected networks of drug trafficking, organized crime, and Khalistan-linked militant groups. These operations led to the dismantling of several criminal and narco-terrorist modules across the State. According to data collated by the *Khalistan Extremism Monitor* (KEM), security agencies arrested 6,831 individuals linked to organized criminal gangs or Khalistan-affiliated networks during the month. An additional 2,282 persons were arrested in drug-related cases, including those involving simultaneous seizures of narcotics and arms. Specifically, seven persons were arrested in five composite seizure cases, 6,589 individuals were apprehended in 41 illegal arms seizure cases, and 2,275 persons were arrested in 2,266 narcotics seizure cases, resulting in significant recoveries of drugs, weapons, and ammunition. Security forces also intercepted a drone used for cross-border smuggling of arms and contraband along the Indo-Pakistan border.

Gopi Nijjar, last witness in the Sukha Kahlwan murder case, shot dead in Kapurthala

Gurpreet Singh aka Gopi Nijjar, the last witness in the Sukha Kahlwan murder case, was shot dead by unidentified assailants at Dhillwan in Kapurthala district on May 1. He was alone in his car when gunmen approached and fired from the front, fatally hitting him in the chest. Nijjar, known to be close to Kahlwan, had reportedly been warned about threats due to his role in the case. A social media post later claimed that Doni Bal and his associates were responsible for the killing, alleging it was in retaliation for Nijjar's links with the Lawrence gang, his reaction to Sidhu Moosewala's murder, and his alleged support to rival criminals.

Two jailed over Khalistani flag at Moga DC office

A special National Investigation Agency court in Mohali on May 1 convicted Inderjeet Singh and Jaspal Singh, sentencing them to five years and six months in jail for hoisting a Khalistani flag on a government building in Moga in 2020 at the instigation of Gurpatwant Singh Pannun. Both were also fined INR 16,000 each under provisions of the IPC, UAPA, and the Prevention of Insults to National Honour Act.

'Get in line': Bishnoi gang shoots at restaurant next to Kap's cafe in Canada; issues warning to Kapil Sharma

A firing incident occurred at the Chai Sutta Bar, located next to Indian comedian Kapil Sharma's outlet, Kap's Cafe, in Surrey, British Columbia, Canada, on May 2. The Lawrence Bishnoi gang claimed responsibility for the attack via social media and issued threats to both the café owner and Sharma. A post attributed to a *Facebook* account named "Tyson Bishnoi Zora Sidhu" warned Sharma to "fall in line" and threatened similar violence if he failed to comply.

Canada spy report flags Indian 'interference' on its soil, Khalistani threat

The Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS), in its *Public Report 2025*, acknowledged the threat posed by extremist Khalistani elements, while clarifying that advocacy for Khalistan remains lawful political activity in Canada. The report revisited politically motivated violent extremism, recalling the Air India Flight 182 bombing – the deadliest terrorist attack in Canadian history – and noted that although no Khalistan-linked attacks occurred in 2025, a small subset of extremists continued to use Canadian soil to support or finance violence in India. It emphasised that non-violent advocacy for Khalistan is not considered extremism, stating that only a limited group using Canada as a base to promote, fundraise, or plan violence – primarily in India – are classified as Khalistani extremists. The report also identified India, alongside China, Russia, Iran, and Pakistan, as key state actors involved in interference and espionage targeting Canada.

Punjab Police use AI voice recognition to target overseas gangster networks

According to reports, Punjab Police have deployed the Punjab Artificial Intelligence System (PAIS), featuring an AI-powered voice recognition tool to track gangs operating from abroad, which recruit local youth. The system includes a "voice bank" of over 84,000 samples and a database of more than 390,000 offenders, with details on gang affiliations. It also offers phonetic search and a gang tree analysis tool, enabling investigators to map criminal networks and link local operatives to foreign handlers.

Punjab DGP, AG gets death threats from Bishnoi gang

Punjab Director General of Police (DGP) Gaurav Yadav and Advocate General Maninderjit Singh Bedi have reportedly received fresh death threats from the Lawrence Bishnoi gang. Officials said the threat to Bedi followed his appearance in petitions seeking a ban on the docuseries Lawrence of Punjab, based on the life of Lawrence Bishnoi, who is accused of running an extensive criminal network from prison. Both Yadav and Bedi have not publicly responded to the development.

Punjab faces renewed threat as MP5 sub-machine guns flood from across border

According to reports, Punjab is facing a renewed security concern with sophisticated MP5 sub-machine guns being smuggled into Indian territory to arm terrorist operatives and organised criminal networks, allegedly at the behest of Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI). Punjab Police recently recorded the third recovery of a foreign-made MP5 in just over 90 days, indicating a surge in cross-border trafficking of advanced weapons, alongside Glock, PX5, and Beretta pistols. Notably, all four MP5s recovered in recent operations bore the marking "Ghaffar Security," which, according to investigators, is commonly linked to illicit firearms manufactured in Pakistan, and associated with underground arms networks supplying high-end weaponry.

Bookie allegedly shot dead by Khalistani shooters in Canada; gang links under probe

An Indian-origin bookie, Simranjit Singh *aka* Sam Canada, allegedly linked to the Lawrence Bishnoi gang as its "accountant" in Canada, was shot dead in a targeted attack in the Newton area of Surrey, Canada on May 4. Investigators were reportedly probing the possible involvement of pro-Khalistan shooters with Indian links. Soon after the killing, fugitive gangster Rohit Godara, who has split from the Bishnoi network, claimed responsibility on social media, describing the victim as a "close associate" and "main handler" of rival groups allegedly involved in match-fixing and illegal betting operations in Canada. The post also warned that others aiding rival gangs would be targeted, though Canadian authorities have not officially verified its authenticity.

Blast outside BSF headquarters in Jalandhar, explosive 'planted' in dustbin

A delivery worker for Flipkart, identified as Gurpreet, was injured in a blast near the gate of the Border Security Force (BSF) headquarters in Jalandhar district on May 5. The explosion occurred while he was returning to his scooter after delivering a parcel, destroying the vehicle and damaging nearby electrical equipment, poles, and shop windows. Preliminary reports suggested that explosive material may have been concealed inside a dustbin located between a BSNL box and the scooter. The dustbin was blown apart in the blast, while the BSNL box was severely damaged.

Terror outfit SFJ threatens Diljit Dosanjh for taking on pro-Khalistani elements

Gurpatwant Singh Pannun, the chief of Sikhs for Justice (SFJ), released a video threatening Punjabi singer-actor Diljit Dosanjh and warned that the group would oppose his upcoming music shows in the United States. The threat followed Dosanjh's remarks during his Aura 2026 concert in Calgary, where he reportedly confronted pro-Khalistan supporters for waving Khalistan flags and raising anti-India slogans. Dosanjh also allegedly directed security personnel to remove the individuals from the venue, drawing applause from sections of the audience.

Canada gang violence: 2 teens killed in targeted attack in Punjabi-dominated Newton neighbourhood

The Integrated Homicide Investigation Team (IHIT), which has taken over the investigation, confirmed that the double homicide was targeted and linked to the ongoing gang conflict in British Columbia. Both victims, residents of Surrey, were reportedly associated with organized crime networks.

Bishnoi gang says firing outside Diljit manager's home 'third warning'

The Lawrence Bishnoi gang on May 11 claimed responsibility for the firing outside the residence of Gurpartap Kang, manager of singer-actor Diljit Dosanjh, in the Gonder village of Karnal district in Haryana. In a social media post, alleged gang associates Tyson Bishnoi, Aarzo Bishnoi, and Harry Boxer claimed the attack was carried out using "Austria-made" weapons and described it as a warning rather than an extortion attempt. They also levelled allegations against a person associated with the singer, claiming that a woman from Punjab was harassed and later abandoned during a recent tour in Australia.

Punjabi-origin founder of California motorcycle club gets 5 years in US jail for illegal arms trade

A Punjabi-origin man, Jashanpreet Singh, founder of the outlaw motorcycle club 'Punjabi Devils' in Stockton, California, was sentenced on May 12 to five years and four months in a United States (US) federal prison for illegal firearms trafficking and possession of a machine gun. The Stockton-based gang, reportedly linked to the 'Hells Angels', used patches featuring a map of Punjab and a turbaned skull, reflecting the group's Punjabi identity. According to the US Department of Justice, Singh attempted to sell a cache of weapons, including assault rifles, machine gun conversion devices and a revolver, to an undercover officer on June 6, 2025. A search of his residence led to the seizure of additional firearms, explosives, a silencer, high-capacity magazines and a suspected Claymore mine. Singh was arrested at San Francisco International Airport on July 26, 2025, while allegedly attempting to flee to India after skipping a court appearance.

A 22-year-old salon worker, Kunal, was shot dead by unidentified assailants in the Tehsilpura area of Amritsar district on the night of May 13. Reports indicate that the attackers allegedly paraded his body on a scooter through Sharifpura in the early hours of May 14 and filmed the act to send videos and photographs to the alleged mastermind. Police suspect the killing was linked to a gang rivalry involving associates of gangster Sukha Ambarsaria. Raids are underway to arrest the main accused, identified as Vansh, while several suspects have been detained for questioning.

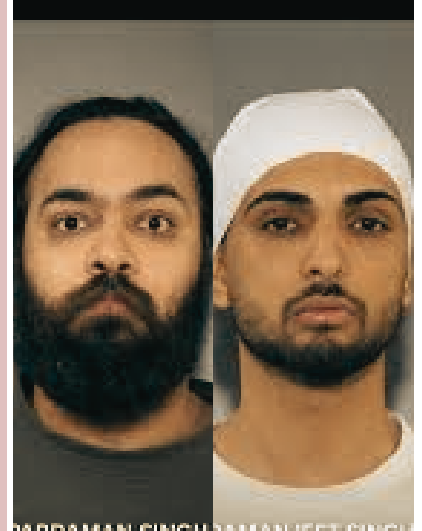




2 Punjabi-origin youth arrested in Canada over extortion-linked shooting at Surrey home

Two Punjabi youths living in Canada, Damanjeet Singh and Pardaman Singh, have been arrested and charged under the Criminal Code following a Surrey Police Service investigation into a shooting linked to extortion threats, in Canada. Police said both accused are foreign nationals and that the Canada Border Services Agency is involved in the case. The incident occurred on April 22, when officers responded to reports of gunfire at a residence in the 13400 block of 87A Avenue in Surrey. Police confirmed damage to a house and a vehicle, but no injuries were reported. Authorities released photographs of the accused and appealed for witnesses or victims to come forward as investigations continue into violent extortion-linked criminal networks.

Jeevan Fauji-linked terror network targeted vulnerable Punjab youth: Police

The Counter Intelligence (CI) wing in Amritsar has uncovered a disturbing recruitment pattern after neutralizing a Babbar Khalsa International (BKI) module allegedly linked to ISI-backed gangster-turned-terrorist Jeevan Fauji, on May 19. Investigators found that vulnerable village youths were first drawn in through local cricket matches, then used for drug smuggling before being tasked with transporting explosives. Two arrested youths, Ajay and Jobanbir Singh, allegedly joined the network through local contacts who promised easy money. Initially used to deliver narcotics for payments of Rs 5,000–7,000, they were later asked to transport foam-wrapped packets that police identified as hand grenades. Police said the grenades were meant to target key establishments and disturb peace in Punjab.

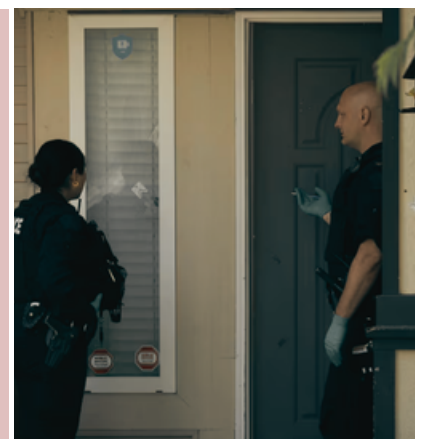

According to reports, the residence of newly elected Cricket Canada president Arvinder Khosa in Surrey, British Columbia, Canada, was targeted in a shooting early on May 20. Multiple bullet holes were reportedly found in the door, windows, and exterior walls of the house. Khosa confirmed the shooting but declined to provide further details. Police said the house was occupied when officers responded around 4:40 a.m., though no injuries were reported. The Surrey Police Service said the investigation is in its early stages, but the incident is believed to be linked to extortion activities.

Punjab Man Held for Streaming Army Convoy Movement to Pakistan

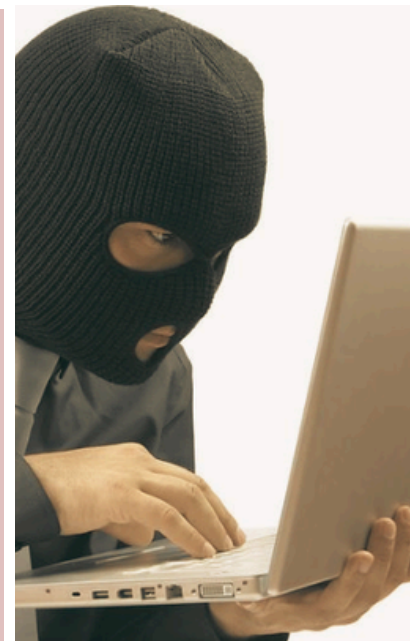
Police on May 21 arrested a man, Baljit Singh, on charges of allegedly spying for Pakistan by transmitting live visuals of military and paramilitary movement along the strategically important Pathankot-Jammu highway, in Pathankot district. The accused allegedly installed an internet-enabled CCTV camera near a bridge on National Highway-44, a key route frequently used by Army and security convoys travelling to Jammu and Kashmir. According to investigators, the surveillance system had reportedly been operational since January 2026, with the live footage allegedly shared with Pakistan-based handlers to monitor troop deployment and convoy movement in real time. Police sources said the accused admitted during interrogation that he acted on instructions from an unidentified contact based in Dubai and allegedly received INR 40,000 for setting up and operating the surveillance network.

West Bengal man's arrest in bomb threat email case reveals 300 Gmail IDs, Pak trail

According to reports, Amritsar Police have arrested a West Bengal-based graphic designer, Sourav Biswas aka Michael, for allegedly being part of a nationwide hoax bomb threat email racket targeting schools and sensitive establishments over the past several months. Police said the accused, originally from Bangladesh, had entered India illegally several years ago. Investigators said Biswas was involved in procuring and selling email accounts used to send anonymous bomb threats. Around 300 Gmail accounts were allegedly bought and resold through Facebook groups and encrypted platforms, including 219 accounts sold to a Bangladesh-based individual via USDT cryptocurrency transactions. Police suspect some accounts were later supplied to Pakistan-based persons involved in spreading bomb threats and other cyber activities aimed at creating panic and disrupting public order.

Punjab Police ASI shot dead by bike-borne assailants in Amritsar

Unidentified armed assailants shot dead a Punjab Police Assistant Sub-Inspector (ASI), identified as Joga Singh, while he was on his way to duty on the Fatehgarh Churian-Majitha Road in Amritsar district on May 24. Singh, who was posted in the Traffic Wing of the Amritsar Police Commissionerate, was travelling to Amritsar on his scooter at around 6 am when two unidentified motorcycle-borne assailants intercepted him about a kilometre before Majitha and opened fire at close range. He sustained bullet injuries to the chest and waist and died on the spot, while the attackers fled after the shooting.

Police arrest Punjabi singer Harbir Singh Sohal with 5.1 kg heroin

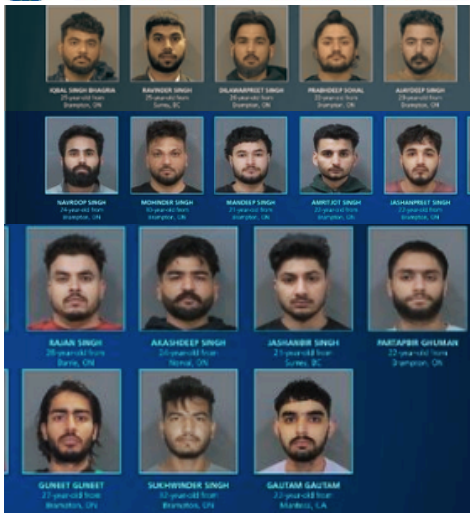
Punjab Police on May 25 arrested Punjabi singer Harbir Singh Sohal and recovered 5.1 kilograms of heroin, INR 150,000 in alleged drug money, and a Mahindra Thar from his possession, in Ludhiana district. Sohal was reportedly a close associate of slain gangster Jaipal Bhullar. In 2022, he was arrested by Mohali Police in connection with illegal weapons possession and an extortion racket allegedly operated at the behest of foreign-based handlers. Khanna Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Darpan Ahluwalia said the breakthrough came during investigations into backward and forward linkages in a drug trafficking case registered by the Doraha Police on March 7.

17 Punjabi-origin youths arrested in Canada in violent extortion ring

Peel Regional Police arrested 17 suspects, most of them young men of Punjabi origin, linked to a violent criminal network allegedly involved in extortion, shootings and arson attacks targeting South Asian business owners in the Greater Toronto Area, Ontario, Canada. According to Police, the group, known as "Four Brothers," was involved in multiple violent incidents targeting restaurants, trucking companies and other businesses in Brampton, Mississauga, Caledon and parts of British Columbia, with links extending to California in the United States (US). Investigators alleged that the network used intimidation, threats and escalating violence to extort local businesses.

Police bust Pak-linked terror module planning attacks in UP, Delhi, Punjab

Four terrorists linked to a module allegedly backed by Pakistan-based gangsters Shahzad Bhatti and Abid Jatt, identified as Mehkab, Gagandeep Singh aka Guri, Shahrukh, and Musharraf, were arrested by the Uttar Pradesh ATS and Special Task Force in Saharanpur in Uttar Pradesh on May 27. The accused had allegedly planned major attacks across Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, and Punjab. According to investigators, the module had conducted reconnaissance of crowded hospitals, a political party office, and a school operator as potential targets. Mehkab and Gagandeep Singh had allegedly surveyed the locations, while Shahrukh and Musharraf were reportedly searching social media platforms for methods to carry out hospital blasts. Investigators further revealed that videos, photographs, and latitude-longitude coordinates of targets in Delhi and Punjab were allegedly shared with Pakistan-based gangster Shahzad Bhatti.

Bishnoi extortion gang sent letter to Canadian police warning it had 1,000 gunmen

According to reports, a Canadian Police officer revealed on May 28 that the India-based Lawrence Bishnoi gang, allegedly linked to Canada’s growing extortion crisis, had sent a letter to a police station in Abbotsford, British Columbia, in August 2025, claiming it had 1,000 foot soldiers willing to carry out shootings. Testifying at a deportation hearing, Constable Kevin St. Louis told the Immigration and Refugee Board that the letter outlined the gang’s criminal network and its role in extortion activities. He said the letter also stated that “every business needs to pay their tax,” indicating the group’s financial motives behind the threats and extortion racket. The Abbotsford Police Department later confirmed receiving the letter.
